he City of Waverly was awarded 4 gallons of paint to help beautify some of the shelters in our parks through the Paint Iowa Beautiful Grant! On July 10 & 11 our Parks Department painted the Droste and Lions shelters, which are located in Memorial Park. The Paint Iowa Beautiful Grant has partnered with Diamond Vogel to assist communities by providing them with the chance to enhance their projects and parks with new paint. Over 12,000 gallons of paint have been provided to nearly 1,300 community projects in Iowa through this grant program.

he Leisure Services Department was also awarded the Bremer County Community Foundation Grant for assistance with purchasing lights for the Waverly Bark Park! In addition, the Bremer County Community Foundation awarded the Economic Development Department with a grant to help repair the raised beds located in the northwest Community Gardens!

Let's talk CROSSWALKS

e have all seen it happen. A hesitant pedestrian waiting on the sidelines of a crosswalk looking for an opportunity to cross the street as vehicles pass by. Do you know who has the right of way in this real-life game of 'Frogger'? The traffic laws in lowa state that pedestrians must obey the rules of the road and the traffic control signals. Pedestrians also determine whether motorists or themselves have the right of way.

Pedestrian's do have the right of way at intersections where there are no traffic lights and when walking within the crosswalk, whether it is marked or unmarked. As a matter of fact, motorists have to yield to pedestrians when they are entering or leaving driveways, parking lots or alleys.

Pedestrian Law also notes that a pedestrian must give right of way to motorists (including cyclists), when crossing a road at any point other than an intersection, where there are no marked or unmarked crosswalks. They also have to give the right of way to motorists and cyclists when crossing a roadway where a pedestrian tunnel or overhead crossing is available.

Crosswalks are scattered throughout Waverly and not all of them are the same. Some have Yield signs planted in the center of the crosswalk, while others might adorn large yellow signs with flashing lights to help attract motorists's attention. Although there might be differences in the inanimate objects that may be there, if you are in a crosswalk, know what

your obligations are as a pedestrian.


infamous nickname of 'The Great Bambino' for the entire tree campaign!


