

challenges facing the community of Waverly as it pertains to school violence and terrorism. The ultimate goal is to stop an attack from happening, but if it does, have the resources



The Waverly Police Department faced another record year in calls for service. The pie chart shows a quick comparison of calls received through the dispatch center for all law enforcement agencies in Bremer County. These calls for service not only stretch the schedule and officers, but stretch the budget as well. The officers should be commended for meeting these increased demands in addition to finding time to do all the extra things to make this a better department for the City of Waverly.

The Waverly Police Department continued Bicycle Education by conducting a Bicycle Rodeo. Wal-Mart helped sponsor this program. The Bicycle Rodeo helps teach young riders how to maneuver safely and instills the importance of bicycle safety equipment.






The Annual Report reflects the activities for the fiscal year 2007-2008. To better understand some aspects of the report a short terminology is indicated below:

Reported Calls are those calls funneled through the Law Enforcement Communications Center. These calls could be from a walk in, phone call, initiated by officers or dispatched call to the department.


<u>Calls for Service</u> are those calls that required documentation for future reference.

<u>Self Initiated Calls</u> are those actions of the officers when they issue citations, warnings and parking tickets.



During 2007-2008 the Waverly Police Department logged 13,816 Reported Calls. We began tracking Reported Calls in 2005-2006 and they have increased each year. Each of these calls may take anywhere from 15 minutes to several hours to complete depending on the given call. There was an increase of 12% from 2006-2007 with an average of 38 calls per day the Waverly Police Department is handling.


Not every reported call or call for service results in an arrest or prepared report. During 2007-2008 there were 4,843 Calls for Service and 4,025 Self Initiated Calls.




This shows an increase of 17% in Calls for Service and a 33% increase in Self Initiated Calls for 2007-2008. The Calls for Service is in line with the increase in Reported Calls and the increase of Self Initiated Calls reflects the increase in motor vehicle traffic in Waverly.

<u>Uniform Crime Report</u> are those calls for service that were serious enough for our officers to prepare a Uniform Crime Report (UCR). The UCR report is a nation wide reporting program facilitated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The FBI is tasked with collecting, publishing and archiving these crimes. UCR reports are broken down


into group A and group B offenses. Generally speaking group A offenses are more serious while group B offenses are less serious or more difficult to classify. During 2007- 2008 there was an increase in each of these groups resulting in a 25% increase in adult and juvenile arrests. The table below shows the trend dating back to 2002-2003.




When reviewing the data there were two areas that were observed to have the most significant increase and that was in Aggravated Assaults and Simple Assault arrests as noted below.



The chart below is a break down of the 13,816 Reported Calls and how they fall by the hour of day received.



We are proud of the ability of our Department and Officers to handle these demands. It is the goal of the Waverly Police Department to provide a safe community and respond to the needs of the citizens.



#### 2007 – 2008 Goals and Objectives Achieved

#### 1. Grant Funded Equipment and Training:

During Fiscal Year 2007 – 2008 the Waverly Police Department received grants totaling approximately \$12,500 for equipment and training. The equipment includes two (2) Digital Ally DVM in-car cameras that were purchased through an \$8,000 grant from the Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau and three (3) M16A1 patrol rifles were received from Department of Narcotics Enforcement 1033 program, each valued over \$550.

The grant funded training courses include Response to Active Shooter, Low Light Building Searches, Highway Drug Investigation, High Risk Event Planning, Patrol Response to Street Drugs and Clandestine Laboratory Certification.

The Waverly Police Department received \$1,000 from the Governors Traffic Safety Bureau for reimbursement of overtime expenses.

#### 2. Training:

The Waverly Police Department continues to attend training to maintain technical and professional proficiency. Waverly Police Officers received training in Interviews & Interrogations, Patrol Response to the Active Shooter, Building Searches, High Risk Event Planning, Patrol Response to Street Drugs, Advanced Narcotics Course, Chemical Munitions, Advanced Vehicle Contraband Concealment Course, Basic Spanish for Law Enforcement, Tactical Warrant School, Anti-Terrorism Course, Tactical Warrant Service, Drug Interdiction, Defensive Driving, Defensive Tactics, Firearms, Blood Borne Pathogens, Fire Extinguisher, Hazardous Materials, Mandatory Reporting, First Aid, CPR and AED.

Waverly Police Officers maintain Instructor Certification through the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy in Firearms (pistol and rifle), Defensive Tactics, Tactical Baton, and Chemical Munitions. Waverly Officers also hold certification in Clandestine Laboratories and Active Shooter. The Firearms Instructors are certified Armor's for both the rifle and pistol. These certifications allow some training and maintenance to be handled "in house" for these areas in an attempt to keep training costs down.







The timeliness of this information is imperative and a photo of the subject or child could get out to the officers patrolling immediately. In car computers are being used for back up communication with other patrol officers and dispatch. If patrol officers loose contact with dispatch due to an intentional act or weather related issue they still can communicate. Officers would also be able to use existing report forms and fill them out immediately after an incident while the information is still fresh in their minds. The reports would be filed electronically saving time by not having to return to the Law Enforcement Center.

The estimated cost for hardware, Panasonic Tough Book, is \$1,600 (\$8,000 for 5 vehicles). The estimated cost for the software through Shield Technology is being negotiated at this time. The two most popular avenues of getting the patrol vehicles connected with the software data are setting up an infrastructure using towers or connecting through air cards. Towers are not practical for the City of Waverly because it is estimated 4-6 towers would be needed to get coverage at \$10,000 - \$15,000 each. Most agencies cannot afford that, so they turn to using air cards. However there is still an estimated monthly cost of \$50 per vehicle per month for just the service to get the

information out to the vehicles. The City of Waverly does have a third option that other agencies don't have. The Emergency 911 Board has equipped our vehicles with Automatic Vehicle Locators (AVL) at a cost of \$1,900 per unit. These units have the ability to make the connection possible, so we would have no cost for relaying the data. The Waverly Police Department and the Bremer County Sheriff's Department have been working jointly to negotiate with Shield Technology. Shield Technology currently provides our software for the buildings Records Management System. The current estimate for the City of Waverly, on a joint project with the Bremer County Sheriff's Office, would be \$19,200 for the software. That puts the project cost at \$27,200 (software and hardware).

The increased activity of work for the uniformed officers has intern created increased work for the Administrative Office. The Office Manager must enter all the data generated by the Patrol and Investigative Division's. There is an average of 357 pieces of data to process monthly between accidents and self initiated acts alone. This does not include the 4,843 calls for service that may need to be filed. Within those calls for service there were 929 that were reported in the Uniform Crime Report that would require the Office Manager to enter those reports into the system manually. This means we know that the Office Manager inputs at least 434 "pieces" on a monthly basis and could be filing up to 834 pieces for every month. Once these items are entered it is the responsibility of the Officer Manager to reply to subpoena request or general requests from groups that might need the data (County Attorney's office, defense attorney, insurance company or citizen). Of course this is just a portion of the duties for the Office Manager. The Waverly Police Department would like to begin researching the possibility of another office position. We would initially look at the option of an Intern Position or a Part Time Position to ensure we stay mindful of budgetary impacts.
